# 14th International Dialogue on Population and Sustainable Development ACCOUNTABILITY TO ADVANCE SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND RIGHTS:

DELIVERING ON COMMITMENTS TOGETHER

### **BACKGROUND**



In September 2015, member states of the United Nations adopted the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, which brought forward the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). These universal goals demand action by all stakeholders to achieve a world that is sustainable, peaceful and prosperous. Although not fully captured in the SDGs, sexual and

reproductive health and rights (SRHR) remain central to this vision. Experience in implementing previous goal sets related to SRHR, such as the Programme of Action of the International Conference on Population and Development (ICPD) and the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs), have shown that reaching such goals is very challenging. The 2030 Agenda, with its focus on interdependency and inclusiveness, serves as a new guide to align efforts for the universal realisation of SRHR, more generally gender equality, and the right to health.

At the global level, the High Level Political Forum (HLPF) serves as the main instrument to follow-up and review the status of implementation of the 2030 Agenda. As agreed in the 2030 Agenda, the HLPF will work with the global SDG indicators that have been presented to the UN General Assembly in September of this year.

Furthermore, the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) and the Commission on Population and Development (CPD) have revised their methods of work in the past years in order to contribute to the follow-up and review of the SDGs at the HLPF. Both commissions are of high relevance for advancing SRHR.

The Global Strategy for Women's, Children's and Adolescents' Health was launched in September 2015 as a roadmap to achieve the health-related SDGs. The Global Strategy includes a Unified Accountability Framework (UAF), which is a mechanism to drive accountability for results, resources and rights, with the ambition to harmonise global efforts. The Partnership for Maternal, Newborn and Child Health (PMNCH) has been tasked with coordinating the implementation of the UAF.

Paralell to this, the UN Secretary General appointed an Independent Accountability Panel (IAP) with producing an annual "State of Women's, Children's and Adolescents' Health" report. This report will provide the world with the best available evidence and an independent analysis of progress, with recommendations for how to accelerate realisation of the Global Strategy.

It still remains to be seen how the different global follow-up, and review frameworks will feed into each other, how they will relate to national and regional implementation strategies and review mechanisms, and if and how it can be ensured that the SRHR-related goals and targets are covered at the different levels.

The primary obligation to provide adequate social services and to ensure the protection, promotion and fulfilment of human rights, however, lies with governments. Good governance requires states to lay the groundwork for the implementation of development strategies by means of legislation, policies, budgets, information and service delivery in a range of areas. Thus, citizens should have the right and opportunity to demand transparency and hold their governments accountable through participation and advocacy in order to ensure that commitments of governments are implemented appropriately down to grassroots and community levels. Governments need to create and fund appropriate mechanisms to ensure the engagement of the civil society so that they can be held accountable.

### **OBJECTIVE**



The overarching objective of the 14<sup>th</sup> International Dialogue is to exchange best practices from national, regional and global follow-up and review mechanisms, and to discuss how they can best be used for measuring progress in the realisation of SRHR in the context of the 2030 Agenda.

More specifically, we want to draw lessons learned by:

- Examining how existing accountability mechanisms have promoted or hindered the achievement of SRHRrelated goals defined in e.g. the Programme of Action of the ICPD or the MDGs;
- Assessing existing national and regional accountability systems regarding their potential contribution to the follow-up and review of the SDGs;
- Addressing how national, regional and global accountability mechanisms can be harmonised across all levels to support the SDG follow-up and review framework.

Based on these lessons learned, the participants of the International Dialogue will jointly strategise on:

- How they within their respective roles and responsibilities can contribute to translating the 2030 Agenda into improved SRHR results;
- How they can support each other in doing so at the national and regional level while also taking into account the experiences from the national reviews at this year's HLPF;
- How meaningful participation and involvement of stakeholders in follow-up and review processes can be achieved:
- How the data and evidence base for the measurement of global and national indicators can be strengthened.

## **RELEVANCE**



In light of the High Level Political Forum held in July 2016, the Independent Accountability Panel in place, the revised methods of work of CSW and CPD, and the SDG indicators presented at the UNGA in September, the 14th International Dialogue on Population and Sustainable Development provides a timely opportunity for stakeholders working in the realm of SRHR to identify what key follow-up

and review mechanisms currently exist at national, regional and global levels, and what necessary actions should follow for advancing SRHR in the follow-up and review framework of the 2030 Agenda.

## **EXPECTED OUTCOMES**



Through exchanging strategies between like-minded policymakers, experts and activists, the 14<sup>th</sup> International Dialogue on Population and Sustainable Development will make a contribution to the global agenda by setting out how to best advance SRHR through the 2030 Agenda. This will be enhanced by capitalising on the opportune timing, which allows shaping approaches to strengthen

cross-regional alliances, drawing on current developments in global SRHR policy across different sectors and taking existing national accountability systems into account.

- Exchange, networking and collaboration between relevant stakeholders from governments, multilateral organisations, implementing agencies, civil society organisations, youth networks and the private sector enhanced:
- Understanding of follow-up and review mechanisms and of how to ensure that SRHR-related issues are adequately measured within the SDG follow-up and review framework improved;
- Recommendations and activities on the national, regional and global level to work jointly towards the successful implementation of the SRHR-related goals and targets of the 2030 Agenda formulated.
